



### 750 YEARS OF MERTON MEMORIES

Memories of making Merton your home away from home, of 'living in' and 'living out' with Oxford landladies, of hiding your female guests in the cupboard from your College scout; memories of Fellows, of tutorials and of standing up for your ideas; memories of doing sports 'just to keep warm' and of rowing at dawn, memories of Summer Eights, Dave Hedge's 'legendary' Pimms and lemonade, and of punting down the river; memories of the cheese and wine nights, the great Bananas and Custard controversy of the Food Suggestions Book, of sconcing in Hall; memories of flower power and the sixties, of student demos, from opposition to the Vietnam War to the Iraq invasion; memories of dressing up for Merton Floats' many theatrical offerings, of the Halsbury Book (before it was removed on the grounds of indecency) and the pigeon-hole post before the invention of email; memories of "maintaining the integrity of the spacetime continuum" (aka the Time Ceremony); memories of the time that The Who played at the Ball in 1969 and the time that Right Said Fred didn't; memories of Finals and of 'being trashed' on Merton Street, of packing up your room and getting ready for the next adventure...
