# FROM THE WARDEN


It is not every year that an institution is presented with 750 years' history to celebrate, nor are there so many 750-year-old entities that are as full of life as Merton was throughout 2014.




















"The best bit was the hunt where you looked in the trees and spelt the Hobbit and got a soft toy at the end."

The new Dobson Organ in the College Chapel came to life and the whole College echoed to its majestic sound throughout the year-long Organ Festival. The College Choir performed *The Dream of Gerontius* in the Sheldonian Theatre, premièred compositions from the Merton Choirbook and toured in the United States.





Merton's historic Library and Archive were well placed to commemorate 750 years of rich history. More than 1,000 visitors were able to see Merton's treasures up close in the Upper Library. A special exhibition in the Bodleian Library and a series of exhibitions, lectures and symposiums in Merton covered a range of Mertonian stories, from the College's foundation in 1264 and its early relationship with its Jewish neighbours, through to Mertonians in the First World War and the marvellous imagination of JRR Tolkien.
