EPIPHANY CAROL SERVICE 5.45pm Sunday 19 January

Welcome to Merton College Chapel for this evening's Epiphany Carol Service. This evening's service is sung by the College Choir & Choristers. Epiphany means 'manifestation', and the Feast of the Epiphany marks the manifesting and revealing of Jesus to the world. The earliest observances of the feast, and many Orthodox Churches today, mark it as a celebration of the Incarnation, and so this carol service begins by recalling that the Christ who was born at Christmas is the 'Word made flesh'.

In the Western church, the Epiphany became an occasion to celebrate one element in the story of Christ's birth: the visit of the far-travelled Magi and the mystical significance of their gifts. St Matthew's account, which we shall hear this evening, speaks simply of 'wise men from the east'. Later tradition fixed their number at three, made them kings and recalled their resonant names—Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar. The Book of Common Prayer subtitles this Feast 'The Manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles', reminding us of the universality of God's love and that the good news of Jesus Christ is for all people.

The next theme of the feast is the Baptism of Christ in the Jordan by John the Baptist, when the heavens were opened and a voice from heaven declared Jesus to be God's beloved Son. The miracle at Cana in Galilee follows, the first of the signs that reveal His glory. The Epiphany season concludes at Candlemas, the commemoration of Christ's presentation in the Temple, which we shall celebrate on Sunday 2 February.

All stand to sing the processional hymn as the choirs and clergy enter the Chapel.
